Fortune Feimster Is Giving the Gays Something to Talk About

The comedian on her pandemic success, going hard on the wine and getting closer to an even bigger break

Fortune Feimster's mouth has been going and going and going. "I talk a lot right now," says the Southern comedian who hails from North Carolina, coughing and clearing her throat as we – that's right – talk on Zoom.

In addition to a daily radio show and her weekly podcast, Feimster, who rose to fame as The Person You See Everywhere in Bit Parts (including "Chelsea Lately," "The Mindy Project" and "The L Word: Generation Q"), has been doing press to talk about the projects she's a part of that have all come out during the pandemic to satiate our need for existential relief. Aside from her own Netflix comedy special "Sweet and Salty," she can be seen hamming it up in a steady flow of films: "Barb and Star Go to Vista Del Mar," "Chick Fight," "Friendsgiving" and "Yes Day," a Jennifer Garner-led family comedy also for Netflix. On TV, she stars in Kenan Thompson's NBC sitcom "Kenan" and voices multiple characters on the Fox animated series "Bless the Harts."

The pandemic has been good to her booming acting career, but also to her love life: Feimster married wife Jacquelyn Smith in a small ceremony in October. She says it's made her an even bigger fan of Michigan given that Jax, as she calls her, is from the Mitten State. "We try to spend at least one holiday — or weekend or two — out there in either Detroit or East Lansing or Grand Rapids. We like it all."

During our conversation, Feimster, yes, talked some more — this time about how her character in "Yes Day" might actually be gay, being drawn to the insanity of "Barb and Star," and feeling like, at last, Hollywood might be

Feimster: I'm doing a lot better. It does feel a lot more hopeful, thank goodness. I mean, it's been a doozy. I can't believe it's been a year. I think we're all thinking back to, you know, where were you when Tom Hanks got COVID? (Laughs.)

CA: Shit got real at that point.

FF: It got real. I don't know why it took that. That first half ... you know, I was supposed to go on this big tour, and my first tour date was actually going to be Grand Rapids on March 15, and they canceled it the night before I was supposed to leave.

We were so excited to go to Michigan, 'cause all (Jax's) family was coming in. But then it just kept going and kept going. (Laughs.) And everybody had to kind of make the most of it. But no one was, like, having a great year, so you have to think and realize the whole world is going through this really hard time. And I think we're getting through it, so I'm feeling optimistic.

CA: A year ago, here in Michigan, at least, it was like, "OK, 14 days. Just



stay in your apartment. Don't leave. And then it's gonna be over."

FF: Yeah, we were so naive. We were rescheduling shows for May of last year, which seems laughable now because we're still trying to figure it out for fall of 2021. I was lucky I got to hunker down with my lady Jax and my dogs. My pets — that's who got us through this time, for sure.

CA: Are you still on the bottle-ofwine-every-other-day regimen?

FF: I got better. That was definitely the first, like, four months. We had to finally be like, "OK, maybe not every night. Maybe once every couple days." Thank god Hollywood started trying to get back rolling (in) I want to say October or so. So I've been really lucky the last few months to be working again. And so, I feel some normalcy when I go to work, even though it's very different at work. Everyone's masked up and (in) face shields. It's a different environment, but whatever it takes to get to do it.

working on right now?

FF: I just wrapped the sitcom "Kenan" for NBC. I have a recurring role. I did not foresee that one coming, so that was a nice little cherry on top. I've been doing "The Netflix Afterparty," which is really cool, with David Spade and London Hughes. And then I had all these movies I think I've had five movies — come out in the last six months. (Laughs.) Which is crazy, but it's because I filmed all of them before the pandemic and they all got held up, the release dates got pushed. They were supposed to originally come out at different times and then, all of a sudden, it was just like, release the movies! (Laughs.) People are like, "You're everywhere."

CA: You seem to pop up in the most random of places. You've played janitors, grave diggers, a fairy gay mother...

FF: Now I need Hollywood to let me do more than be the fun pop-up that brings some laughs. I'm ready to really sink my teeth into some bigger roles. So hopefully that's coming.

CA: Is that what you've been working

toward'

FF: Yeah, I do a lot of development, I do a lot of writing, and I've sold a couple movies to Amblin (Entertainment). In the past I've sold TV shows to ABC. So I'm trying to get one of those movies off the ground that we've written. We wrote another movie in quarantine that we hope to pitch around. I created those TV shows because I was trying to give myself an opportunity to, like I said, be a bigger part of a show.

And I got to film my pilot for ABC, which is really cool, even though that didn't move forward. It eventually led to me doing "The Mindy Project." So now with movies, I've been kind of focused on writing movies, because I've been lucky to be in a lot of movies, especially lately. Sometimes in Hollywood you just have to write that yourself.

CA: So I have, in honor of "Barb and Star Go to Vista Del Mar," this special little "Barb and Star" cup.

FF: I love it. That was one of my favorite movies to do. That was such a treat, seeing that come out. The only bummer is: that's a movie you want to see with a house full of people in a theater. It's one

of those movies, I think, that is infectious, 'cause people are laughing (and) it makes other people start laughing and you're all laughing together. So I'm glad it came out (so) people can enjoy something silly during quarantine. But hopefully — I don't know if you can, like, release the movie online and then also put it back in the theater. (Laughs.)

CA: The movie's gonna live on in gay cult film culture anyways, so every year, actually, it should get a theatrical release.

FF: I hope so. It does seem that gay men in particular really took to that movie, which makes me so happy. People either loved it and are obsessed with it, or they were like, "I hated it. I turned it off after 20 minutes." And I just wanted to be like, "Well, maybe you aren't the target audience."

CA: Did you know what you were getting yourself into when you signed up for that movie?

FF: I knew that my part was pretty subdued. Like, we were the Talking Club and that we were sitting around, talking





about ridiculous stuff. I was on a plane and I read (the script), and I was crylaughing reading this. Most scripts you're just kind of going through like, "Yeah, that's cute. That's cute." You know? But this had me crying. So I knew the movie was insane, and I was like, "God, how are they going to pull this off?" And I was like, "If they're asking me to be in this movie, I'm being in this movie. It's the best thing I've read in so long."

CA: Why Pinky? Is there a story behind your character's name?

FF: There's no backstory. There's very little backstory on the Talking Club, which makes me want Kristen (Wiig) and Annie (Mumolo) to write a sequel, which also involves the Talking Club. I want the sequel to be them coming back from their trip, telling the Talking Club.

CA: Do you know any women like Barb and Star, or Pinky? Are you friends with any?

FF: Oh, gosh. I mean, I've hung out with plenty. I'm from the South, so those outfits are certainly, uh, not foreign to me. We're all like, "These outfits are

hysterical." And people from home were like, "That's what I wear."

CA: In addition to "Barb and Star," of course, you're in "Yes Day." You play Jean, the paramedic. Is it safe to say that you probably shouldn't be, um, driving an ambulance?

FF: One-hundred percent, I should not be. Yeah, Jean (owns a) fleet of ambulances, even though she sucks at driving that one. It's always fun to pop in as these characters, like you said, that kind of just are a little off. That's kind of my brand of humor.

And I love this movie, 'cause, well, first off, Jennifer Garner. I've been a fan of hers for so long. And I was nervous to meet her just because she's done so many projects and is still in my category of "movie star," which you don't have as many these days. And she was so lovely. In my very first scene with her I had to drive the ambulance. And I felt like Jean because I was ... I didn't know. I mean, they teach you how to work everything and they make sure you're comfortable, but I'm trying to do my scene and, like, pull the air brakes and do the siren and it was just like walking

and trying to rub your head and your stomach at the same time. It was a lot to sort of figure out, having just met Jennifer Garner. (Laughs.)

CA: I feel like in the last year because of the pandemic every day has been a "no day." I mean, even for the adults, right? What will be your "yes day" when you can finally say yes to the things that you've been saying no to? FF: Oh, man, just hugging people. My friends, especially. A lot of hugs. I mean, every day is a yes day for me when it comes to like, "Are we gonna order out or have wine?" I'm always like, "Yes." So I probably need to reel in my yeses. But I will just be excited to get to travel again and see my family. And so, I'll be saying ves to a lot more social activities. whereas before I was like, "I just wanna go home and sit on my couch."

CA: What's the history between you and the other ambulance driver, Karen, in the movie? Because I get the impression that they could have been a couple. I mean, you took her life savings.

FF: I know. I feel like they were alluding

to ... I mean, they never told me what their actual relationship was: if it was a relationship, if it was best friends, if I was her best friend and took her life savings. Uh, then that's a really bad friend. If it's her partner, then that's OK. (Laughs.) I'm gonna assume that Karen's probably my partner and my lady.

CA: You're also featured in the upcoming FX docu-feature "Hysterical." Can you talk a bit about your involvement and what it seeks to examine about you and other queer women comedians?

FF: It was spearheaded by Jessica Kirson, who's a very hilarious, respected comedian out of New York, who is also gay. She and the producers just picked what women they wanted to highlight, and we were lucky enough to be included and just share experiences about being a woman in comedy and what that means. They filmed us each at our house and then a little bit on stage. It's definitely not easy being a woman in comedy. And so, it just sort of highlights our journey.

It's a journey that isn't talked about as much. You see tons of things on standup, and it's usually very maledominated. So this is just coming at it from a very different perspective, a very inclusive perspective, as far as LGBT and women of color. People with different backgrounds, people with different voices, women with different experiences and what they talk about on stage. I'm happy to be a little part of it.

CA: Before you go, I want to wish you congratulations on your Netflix special, "Sweet and Salty," which received a Critics' Choice nomination.

FF: Oh, thank you. Appreciate it. Yeah, it was my first hour special. I had done a half hour with Netflix, and this was a big jump for me to get to do an hour. I was so ready for it. I was working this material a ton. I was really proud of it. And to get to share my story and my journey about coming out and figuring out who I was, and being representation for people and having it be on this worldwide platform, where people who might live in places where they don't know a lot of gay people or they don't see themselves in another person — it was really special to me to be able to do that, and make people laugh at the same time.

I got so much love from it and it was incredible, but I didn't know if the industry was paying attention at all. That they are watching and that they saw



something in it was really special. Just really made me feel, finally, after all these years of being out in LA and putting in this work, that people noticed, and it meant a lot to me. And now I've got to work toward the next one.

History, Hiking, and More During Your City By the Bay Visit

No sooner had I stepped off my Southwest Airlines flight at San Francisco International Airport (SFO) than I was in a LGBTQ history exhibit like none other

The new Harvey Milk Terminal (aka Terminal One) which has been open less than a year at SFO showcases the life of former San Francisco Supervisor Harvey Milk. Milk was a LGBTQ political trail blazer in so many respects. He was the first openly gay individual elected to office in California (in 1977) and served just 11 months before being murdered by another Supervisor, Dan White who also murdered Mayor George Moscone. The amazing life of one of the nation's first openly LGBTQ politicians is showcased in a half mile exhibit as you walk down the new terminal named in his honor. The terminal exhibit alone is worth a visit to the City by the Bay.

WHERE TO STAY

I always stay at Beck's Motor

Lodge near the Castro right on Market Street. Shops and restaurants are nearby and the rates are reasonable. It is also out of the touristy areas and in the heart of the gayborhood. It has free parking but you won't need a car. Other options nearby include the Parker Guest House and The Willows.

WHAT TO DO

A walk along Castro Street is another history lesson with famous LGBTQ folks embdedded in gold sidewalk displays. Learn about the lives of LGBTQ legends, many from the Bay Area. The City was and is a magnet for LGBTQ folks and is still cutting edge today.

San Francisco safe outdoor hiking options abound. From my motel (Becks Motor Lodge), you can hike up to Buena Vista Park for great views of the Bay Area and Twin Peaks.

Then hike over to Corona Heights for more great views of the City by the Bay (with lunch at the Josesphine Café

at the Randall Museum). A hike up to Twin Peaks is another option from the Castro.

A bit further is the amazing Golden Gate Park and the beaches on the Pacific Ocean.

We took BART from 24th/Mission down to the Embarcadero. We stopped at Rincon Center with 1930 era murals of the history of California. Then we headed over to the Ferry Building for lunch and shopping.

Head over to the new rooftop gardens at the Salesforce Tower Transbay Transit Terminal that features a display in the mile-long garden of the various types of ecosystems that thrive in the Mediterranean climate of this amazing state. Don't miss the redwood garden.

A walk thought the Financial District up to Union Square is another must.

If you have a car, try Edgewood County Park on the Peninsula just down I-280 south of the City on the



world's most beautiful freeway (really).

NIGHTLIFE

The bars are open in the Castro Street neighborhood are slowly re-opening and include The Lookout (3600 16th Street at Market) has a great deck overlooking the street scene.

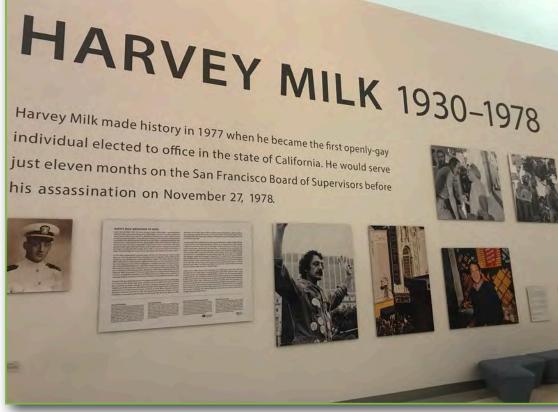
Twin Peaks Tavern at Market and Castro (401 Castro) bills itself as the Gateway to the Castro and features Irish Coffee and drink specials. It also has outdoor seating and great views of the street action. Hi Tops at 2247 Market is another fun sports bar with outdoor seating.

RESTAURANTS

Eric's on Church Street (accessible via the J Church Metro Line) has great lunch specials. It is a Chinese restaurant with tasty homecooked healthy ingredients.

In nearby West Portal, enjoy Italian food at the amazing Spiazzo Restaurant. Try the salmon. (Catch the K or L line bus from the Castro.) West Portal also abounds with other options for dining.

Peet's Coffee is across the street from Beck's Motor Lodge is a great



breakfast option for to go selections. **GETTING THERE**

I took Southwest to SFO and flew back out of Oakland International Airport (OAK). Both are convenient options served by the BART transit system. Get a Clipper Card and you can also use it on the San Francisco bus system, Muni.

FOR MORE INFORMATION

Check out the *Bay Area*Reporter (http://www.ebar.com or pick up a printed copy). They just celebrated their 50th anniversary. Bay

Times is the other local LGBTQ publication. Both are great sources for ideas on what to do while visiting and current updates on what is open and what is not.

Keith Styker needs our help to battle prostate cancer

Keith Stryker was 47 when he was diagnosed with a rare and very aggressive form of early stage 4 prostate cancer, that according to his urologist, would have killed him in two years.

Keith's Story

People often ask me, "How did you know you had issues with your prostate, what made you get checked?" For me it was listening to my body, being aware of subtle changes, those little indicators that something is off. It's not as blatant as a "check engine" light but you know there's an issue. I was urinating more frequently and ejaculation was different than the usual 'hitting the headboard'; instead it was just a sad dribble. I made an appointment to see my doctor right away. That was December 2019.

Å digital rectal exam showed it to be hardened and enlarged. The PSA test (prostate specific antigen, a blood test that detects an antigen produced by your prostate when there's infection, irritation or cancer) was 17.6 ng/ml; well past the normal range of 0-2 ng/ml for a healthy prostate. A biopsy of the prostate

showed about 60% of it cancerous and scans appeared to show an early spread to a nearby lymph node and fatty tissue surrounding the prostate.

This past February, after 6 months of very successful hormone deprivation therapy, I had a prostatectomy (prostate removal) surgery and removed the surrounding lymph nodes. The tumor on the prostate had shrunk 80%. The lymph node in question had only scar tissue remaining. I have 5 months of hormone therapy left and treatment will be complete. According to all recent tests and scans, there is no sign of cancer and the next 5 months of HT will ensure that any possible microscopic metastatic cancer cells don't survive.

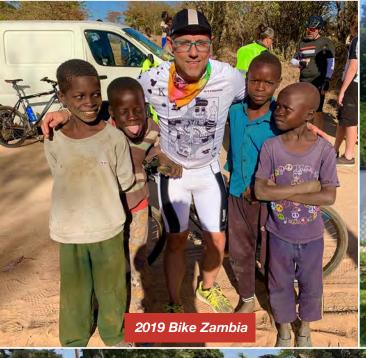
I can only speculate, but had I waited another 6 months to look into what I knew were subtle changes in my bodily functions, the cancer might have metastasized to major organs and I'd be undergoing chemotherapy or even worse, dead. (This is not the case for most prostate cancers as it's generally slow growing.)

Men, listen to your body. Don't be

afraid of your butt. Let's be real, that IS what prevents most men from getting their prostates checked. Get over it. And finally, educate yourself on the prostate and its functions. One in eight men in the US will get prostate cancer and of those men, 99% will survive with proper treatment.

Keith Stryker is the founding member and Captain of TEAM CÜR (Chicago Urban Riders), and you may recognize him from years of working as a bartender on the Halsted strip. Since 2011, he has done 11 rides including Ride For Life Chicago (formerly RFAC), AIDS/LifeCycle, and Bike Zambia, raising over \$63,000 personally and raising roughly \$640,000 as a team for HIV charities.

Dodie Is Building an Understanding of HerselfAfter feeling rushed to come out to find community, the YouTuber's debut LP had the bisexual artist reexamining her sexuality

To know Dodie is to *really* know her. Since 2011, the British singer-songwriter's diary-wide-open authenticity has drawn millions of fans to her YouTube channel doddleoddle and its sister channel, doddlevloggle.

Those faithful fans — she once considered calling them "doddlers" — were with her in 2016, when, after establishing an online presence, she released her first EP. The result was the intimate "Intertwined," a collection of songs tackling mental health, sexuality and friendship. Another EP, "You," followed in 2017. Her third, "Human," was released in 2019.

"Build a Problem," though, is Dodie's full-length debut, written over a two-year span during a period of self-discovery after she came out in 2017 as bisexual with a song and video called "I'm bisexual – a coming out song!" (the video has amassed six million views on YouTube). After being pushed back three times, she's eager for the album to come out on May 7, she tells me over Zoom from her studio flat in London. But first things first: all the stuff strewn across her floor that she thought she hid.

"Excuse my room," she says, after rushing home from a walk to get on the call. "I didn't realize how messy it was, and that it was gonna show."

Chris Azzopardi: When the album finally comes out, how do you anticipate that you will feel?

Dodie: (Laughs.) Relieved, released.

Free. And yeah, I mean, I have no idea. It's why I gritted my teeth when I heard that you listened to it, because I just have no idea how people will respond. I've already spoken to a lot of people who have listened to it, like my friends and also some fans, and that's been nice. From what I hear, they all really like it. And that, honestly, is enough for me. If I could just share the Dropbox link around to everyone and get their feedback, that's enough to keep me going.

CA: It must feel weird to create a piece of work that is so close to you and so intimate and not know how anyone will respond to it.

Dodie: Yeah. I'm just so ready to move

on. I feel like I'm holding onto this album and to all of these feelings associated with it. And like, obviously, my life has moved on. I've grown up and grown since writing (it), but I feel like I can't properly move on until I've released it, which I don't know if it's healthy or not. But it definitely feels like a part of my life.

CA: How would you compare the songwriter you were when you first started writing songs to the songwriter you are on this album?

Dodie: I think I've always been very dramatic in my songwriting. Not, like, in an overt way. I think what I mean is: I love building tension and release in my songs. I love over-soaring melodies. I love creating dynamics, like such a range in my songs. So I think that's similar.

The difference is that I'm better. (Laughs.) I honestly just think the way in which I look at life has changed. I look at life in a more nuanced way now, whereas when I was younger I wrote more black and white, obviously, because that's how I saw the world. So, if anything, the meanings of my art have gotten more mature. Probably the sound of my music as well. In terms of writing style, I really don't know, to be honest. That's a good question. I have to think about it.

CA: Did the pandemic open up this creative well for you? And did you write the album, or any of it, in the pandemic?

Dodie: I wrote half of the album in the pandemic. The deluxe side, and all of those songs, I was uploading them in the first wave, as it were. And I felt, yeah, definitely creatively inspired. It gave me all of the time I needed and the space I needed to start writing and finishing all of these little snippets of songs and tweak them and form them into demos. Then the next wave of the pandemic was the complete opposite and I just sort of fell into a slump.

CA: A lot of this music, from what I read, brought you closer to the person that you are right now. Did any of it help inform your sexuality or the discovery of new parts of your sexuality?

Dodie: Yes! Great question. I think it took me a while to really understand what it meant to come out as bi. I think when I was younger I was so excited to (come out) because, firstly, it felt like a very exciting thing and I wanted to rush out and say it, like get in with the crowd because I felt very kind of lonely and weird in it. I wanted to immediately be a



part of this community. And it felt good. And then I grew up. (Laughs.)

I realized that all of those sort of inner biphobic workings of growing up where I did, and the family that I had, caught up with me, and I realized it was a bit more difficult than I thought and that I had a lot more to work through and a lot more to understand about it. And I'm still working through it; I'm still trying to understand. And, yes, everyone always says that sexuality is complex — as is gender, as is everything in life — but I think I'm only just beginning to understand what that means and still understand myself more.

CA: So when it comes to identity, are you still using the bisexual label?

Dodie: I think it's easier to say bisexual because that's what I am. It's hard to even talk about what love is for me and what attraction is for me because it just keeps shifting. I still don't really know myself very well when it comes to relationships. So, I just don't think I can land solidly on talking about any of that. All I know is that I'm bisexual and that means something to me.

CA: It's pretty incredible to think that six million people watched you come out on YouTube in 2017 with "I'm bisexual — a coming out song!" That's a lot of people. How do you reflect on that moment and coming out in such a big way?

Dodie: I think it's very sweet. I think I have a lot of queer fans. A lot of young queer fans, right? At least I definitely did at that time, probably following a song that I put out when I was even younger than that called "She," which was about liking a friend of mine who was not bi or gay in any way. Also, before I even knew that I was, it was just this vague, flirty song about really finding someone attractive and kind of knowing what it was, but not really sticking a pin (on) it. It just makes the whole feeling so much softer when I understand that so many have gone through that feeling and are now going through that feeling.

CA: Bisexuality still seems to be taboo. Do you think we're past that? What is your personal experience with that?

Dodie: I think we're past it in a way, but I still think there's so much stigma inside that label even. To be fair, I see it talked about on TikTok a lot in a very nice way, in a comforting way, where people explore how you can be bisexual but still be in a "straight" relationship. Just all of the complexities. Basically, your history

doesn't have to align with your orientation. It's just a very confusing mess that I think people still don't understand because the world looks at things in a very strict putting-in-boxes way when really, of course, everything is more nuanced than that.

CA: When I think of boxes now, the boxes are even less so than the boxes that I had to put myself in.

Dodie: I would have lost my mind. I don't know what I would have done. I mean, I still am because the inner biphobia (is) still there. Sometimes I lie in

the bath and I'm like, "Oh, fuck! I think I'm gay." Like, "Oh fuck, I've been lying to everyone, I've been lying to myself." And I'll be like, "Shit, I must be completely straight, I just love girls, like everyone else, oh god." I still flip back and forth because we've all been brought up in this "either-or" world and then as soon as I find the word bi again and I really understand what that means, I'm like, "OK. everything's better now."

CA: I'm interested in knowing a little more about your queer fans, because you have such a following. What kind of fans are they?

Dodie: Yeah, they're very sweet. I mean, I haven't really come

into contact with them for a while. You know, for at least a year or so. (Laughs.) But I've seen so many grow up, kind of, with me. I get really emotional when I think about how weird I felt as a teenager, or a kid even, just like a complete outsider, and very dramatic and deep-feeling.

And yeah, OK, I'll say it: I have a friend called Elle Mills. She's a YouTuber and she's really cool. You can tell her fans apart from mine because hers are all the cool kids in school, and mine are all of the arty-farty fairies who are a bit weird. And like, I felt ... I don't know ... slow in the hierarchy of school. And now I understand there wasn't a hierarchy at all; it's just kind of people. And I feel like I've collected a community of them and

that makes me feel really good.

CA: That's really sweet. Do you have a name for these fans? You know, like Mariah has her "lambs" and Gaga has her "little monsters."

Dodie: (Laughs.) I toyed around with "doddlers," but I didn't want to imply that we're an army or anything like that. I didn't want to be like, you know, the leader of this army or whatever. I think that's strange.

CA: And yet you kind of are that leader. It's you who brings these



people together, right?

Dodie: Kind of. I don't know. I like it when I become a very separate thing. There's a sort of fandom that I'm not even really a part of. I really love that. I think that's so sweet.

CA: What do you hope your queer fans take away from your example in living so openly in regards to your sexuality?

Dodie: I would love for them to feel better about the complexity and the guilt of it all, I think. I don't really know how many (songs) exactly are about being queer; I'm sure it floats in and out of all of my writing. But in "She" and a song called "Rainbow," there's a lot of struggle. As much as it is a celebration,

there's a lot of pain and shame in there. I would hope in sharing that it lightens their load a bit, because I know that it's a really heavy thing to carry around. And I would love for us to share that and feel better together.

CA: Celebrities were once people who seemed so unattainable. But you've built an entire career on being your most authentic self. Do you think it's important for people in the LGBTQ+ community to be able to relate to the artists that they listen to and that they love?

Dodie: I don't think it's necessary. I wouldn't want to enforce a breaking of boundaries on anyone. I grew up seeing, yeah, you're right, celebrities as these like unreachable aliens that I didn't really understand existed. And so when I kind of became someone that people knew about, that I probably would have deemed to be famous when I was younger, I wanted to break that and almost reach into my younger self and shake her and be like. "Look! These people are human and everyone is human. You walk this earth with these people." Yeah, I'm not sure if it's necessary or incredibly important, but I do find it interesting and I like that I am someone who can do that.

CA: What will you be doing to celebrate Pride this summer?

Dodie: I haven't even thought about it. Isn't that so weird? I think probably just connecting with people online. I don't know. Maybe I should work on that. Maybe Pride is something I should partake a little bit more in.

CA: It sounds like you've had some new thoughts about sexuality in the last several years, so maybe it's time for a follow-up to "I'm bisexual."

Dodie: Yeah. Though I don't know if I'm ready to share them yet, because I don't even know what they are. I still don't understand myself, really. Maybe I'll just say that.

Black AIDS Institute Founder Phill Wilson on Living Through Dual Pandemics

We're coming off a historic year in 2020. A year that devastated us and empowered us. A year that tested us and made us stronger. A year that put systemic racism and health disparities front and center for the world to see. It reminded us that there is still much work to be done in the fight for equality and equity yet inspired us to act toward progress.

We are still in the middle of a pandemic that has claimed the lives of over 500,000 Americans, but amid the struggle we are beginning to see a light at the end of the tunnel. As the COVID vaccine allows us to feel hope, I reflect on what this feeling must be like for long-term survivors of HIV. Many remember when a new unknown virus emerged that was claiming the lives of their loved ones. A virus that they still live with today.

As we work to manage the current pandemic, many who have been living with HIV for decades once again find themselves losing loved ones. Reliving the past, grateful for what science has brought so quickly, and cautious to not let history repeat itself.

I recently had a conversation with Phill Wilson, founder and former CEO of the Black AIDS Institute. As many know, Phil is a gay Black man who has been living with HIV since 1981. He has been a champion and leader in this work for decades and understands better than anyone the concerns facing people living with HIV and the parallels to COVID, especially in Black communities. He says:

"This experience presents both an emotional as well as a physical health risk. We're living dual experiences because we're not yet finished with the HIV pandemic, and we're now living with COVID. There is kind of a painful déjà vu going on as COVID-19 is manifesting itself in our communities in the way HIV continues to manifest itself in our communities. Chief among them are the disparities. Black communities

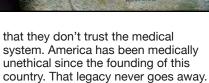
were slow to respond to the HIV/AIDS pandemic while we were

disproportionately impacted, and policy makers were not sufficiently concerned about our needs. That is being replayed with COVID-19 as well."

It should be very apparent at this point that ending HIV and COVID-19 is about more than just access to medicine and vaccines. It's about dismantling the systems of oppression that allow these viruses to thrive and recognizing that Black and other marginalized communities have a long history of distrust of the medical system. Many remain traumatized by the Tuskegee experiment, Henrietta Lacks, the experimental procedures performed on enslaved women, and the list goes on.

"Black people have very legitimate reasons to have medical mistrust because the medical community has not always been responsive to our needs," Wilson says. "The most dominant way we have been mistreated by the medical community is by them withholding treatment from us." Tuskegee is an example of that, as the Black men involved received no treatment for syphilis, and Wilson believes that is exactly why we should be fighting for information and access to the vaccine now.

I wholeheartedly agree with him and at the same time understand that as much as I urge Black communities to get into HIV care, utilize PrEP and take the COVID vaccine, I know it's not that simple. Medical racism is real, and the challenge is on America to overcome it. We can urge people to take this vaccine without shaming them or judging them for being skeptical. It's not Black people's fault

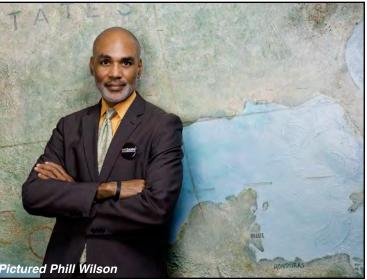


Therefore, my job and that of everyone who calls themselves an advocate or is a part of the medical system in any way is to improve trust by providing equitable care and accurate information that allows people to make informed decisions about their health. We need all of us collectively working together. So many people have already lost their lives. Wilson cautions us to not repeat past mistakes, saying:

"These are lessons that we've learned and, frankly, the consequences of screwing up. I'm hoping we can take the lessons of HIV/AIDS, apply them, and come up with more equitable solutions as we fight the pandemic. And one of them is making sure that medicine, vaccines, and prevention tactics and strategies are open and accessible to Black, brown and other marginalized people."

Simply put, we honor the past by fighting for the now, fighting for the future. Let's ensure we all survive.

Registering The New Voter: Why It Is More Than Registering Voters

The 2020 elections saw a massive surge of voting, drawing the largest number of voters since the election of 1900. This huge increase in voting showed, with some unexpected results, that the care and feeding of the world oldest and most important democracy really does rest on just one thing: voting. This map shows what happens to voting when we look only at the young vote: Arizona, which birthed Barry Goldwater, and has long been a conservative bastion, turns blue. Texas turns blue. That this can be attributed to the young vote is hardly a surprise.

The 2018 mid-term elections saw an uptick in voting, as many people, especially the young, voted at higher rates. Although this uptick was welcome, we still have a crisis of voting, in that not enough of us do it.

Why? The Founders, the white men who wrote the constitution, who muscled the adoption of it through the warring factions that made up the original 13 colonies, made compromises to get the 2/3rds of the colonies votes needed to allow its adoption. They allowed the adoption of the compromise that there would be NO federal oversight of voting, that the states would be in charge of all elections, even federal ones. The small colonies were concerned that they would be overwhelmed by the large states, so they insisted on equal numbers of Senators, 2 per state, and used the House Of Representatives as a way for proportional representation. They also restricted voting to white men with property, and for the state legislators to choose their Senators direct election of Senators would not take place until 1913. Voting was for elites, and echoes of that resonate today.

There has been progress — women got the vote in 1919, minorities got the vote when President Lyndon Johnson pushed through the Voting Rights Act, and the Civil Rights Act. He failed to get the voting age lowered to 18, although he tried. Two states, Oregon and Texas, used the federal courts to delay the implementation of 18 year old voting, and the voting age was only lowered

after President Nixon brokered a deal, and the constitution was amended to allow for 18 year olds to vote.

So, there has been progress, yet voting remains anemic. Most federal elections are decided with 50% of the eligible voters voting; some elections, like Mayor's races and school board elections can be decided with as little a 6% of the eligible voters turning out. The 2020 elections, with a presidential race, saw voter turnout in New Mexico of a little over 52%. This is still awful.

We are now facing a huge bulge of new voters, the millennials, and their numbers are astounding. This chart shows birth rates, and this bulge of population can determine every election, if they choose to vote and choose to register to vote and to vote. The 64,000 dollar question: Will they?

We, Everybody Votes, and The New Mexico Voter Group, have established organizations to focus on registering voters. We have focused on the nuts and bolts of registering voters: setting up tables, getting forms, getting the young voter to register, getting the forms to the County Clerk. Yet, we despair that we are not doing enough. Many eligible voters, especially the voung ones, breeze by us, muttering something vague about "no voting." We have registered a huge chunk of voters, with few resources, and so we know that it can be done. Yet, we are NOT efficient, we need to scale, we need to have voter registration brought to the fore all over the country. Clearly we could use resources, money, but we also believe that we need a revolution in the person that registers the vote, the Voter Registration Agent. How do we do this?

In short, we need to move voter registration from a passive endeavor to an active one. Oregon, with its automatic voter registration, is showing how this can work. Vote by mail elections seem to increase



participation. Yet, the adoption of these nationwide seems to be a ways off, and we need to register these voters now.

"We have listened closely to the voters that we do register, and the ones that don't want to register. Although we are reluctant to draw broad conclusions, because there was no designed research study, it was simply observational, there was enough data for us to draw some conclusions:"

The person who registers someone to vote is the very first contact that people have with the mechanics of democracy. The Voter Registration Agent needs to be prepared to both register the voter, and to give the person registering a reason WHY to register, and why they need to vote. That is asking a lot, but it seems to be the requirement to have a successful encounter.

- 1. Few states require any training for people that want to register other voters. New Mexico, which requires a training class, is one of the strongest. Their training, handled by the county clerks, requires an understanding of the registration form, and requires a formal issuance of a voter registration number. The state issues a VRA certificate, and assigns a number, which allows for the tracking of the activities of the Voter Registration Agent.
- 2. We have, in New Mexico, a huge number of people who have taken the class required to register their fellow citizens to vote. Yet, we have few who actually do it. It appears that many

people are willing to register others to vote, but then after taking the class, they fail to do so. We hypothesize that many of the VRA's feel ill-equipped to register voters, even after the class, so they don't.

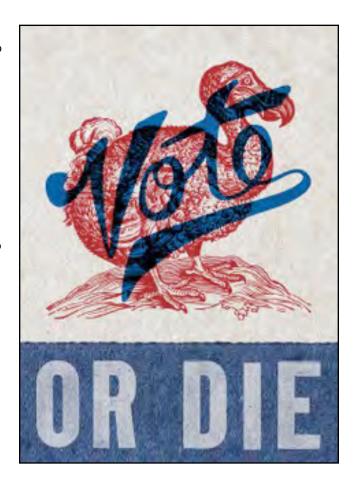
We have a huge task ahead of us. We have proven, as evidenced by the turnout in the 2020 elections, that voting is the key. The election saw the best turnout in 120 years. We need to continue, and to train and make sure that the people doing voter registration are prepared. They need to know when the next election is. They need to be able to explain the role of the voter in the democratic process. They need to be able to rebut conventional wisdom, in that "My vote doesn't count," and explain how that vote DOES count.

None of this will simply happen. We need a complete curriculum that teaches people to register voters. We need to teach the person that is registering what they need to know: facts, how the process works, what is coming up in the very near term that the new voter will vote on. Stacy Abrams, who led a group that registered 800,000 voters in Georgia, shows what can be done with leadership and political will: she, and her group, will help decide the balance of power in Washington. If the two

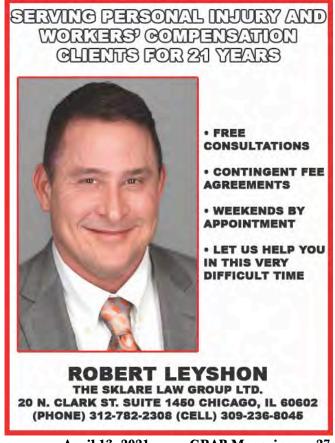
Senate seats that are in a runoff can both go Democratic, then the Democrats will hold a razor thin margin in the Senate, giving the Biden Administration the ability to govern.

We need resources, we need direction, we need to scale. We can and have identified the problem, and we need to quickly implement the solution. We can do it, if we want to. Do we, as citizens of the worlds oldest and most important democracy, have the will to do this? I hope we do. I believe we can.

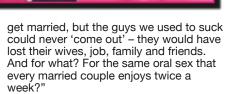

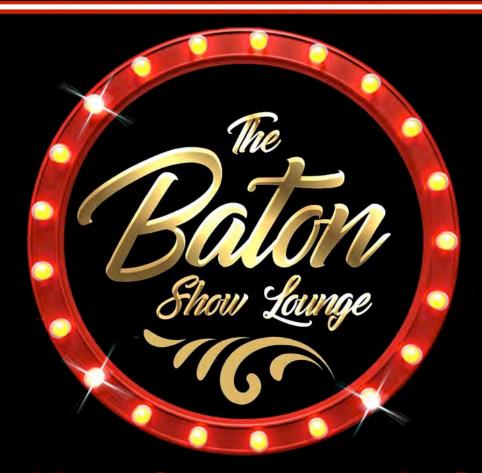

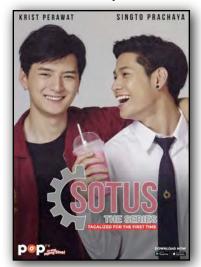
Or course once love breaks out, can envy and murder be far behind? Season 1 will have you on the edge of your seat, and Season 2 looks back at cues we might have missed as the murderer is identified.

This is great popcorn material, but presents interesting questions about

religion and acceptance. The fact that the non-traditional bi and gay relationships are included as part of the spectrum of the students lives, and gives you hope for kids in the future.

SOTUS is from Thailand, and has some of the same themes, without the flesh and obvious sexuality.

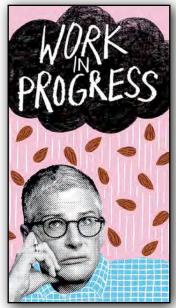

McEnany has been a standout in the Chicago comedy scene for 20 years, and all that training shows in episodes that – perfectly matched by Mason's directing – are funny, crisp, and educational.

This is a great show for people wondering about pronouns, what non-binary means, and worry about the future of gender discussions in years to come. In WORK IN PROGRESS, the future is here.

McEnany stars as Abby, a woman ill at ease in both her own body and the world around her. When her sister sets her up on a date with Chris, an attractive server, we hope that Abby can indeed find love with this handsome transman. But if she cannot find love, perhaps there is comfort and contact. Fans of Chicago theater will no doubt recognize some ensemble players including Delia Kropp and Parker Guidry, among others. Another part of the fun is identifying the many Chicago locations...street corners, restaurants, the great late Uptown Underground, and many more.

SG: How did a nice Jersey boy like you find your way to Helix?

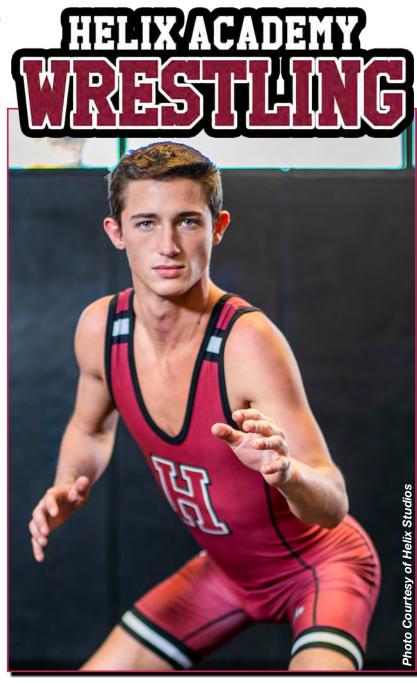
DP: I applied on the website and not too long after, I got a text inviting me to an audition!

KRISTAL LARSON IS SECOND OUT TRANS PERSON ELECTED IN IL HISTORY

Washington, DC – LGBTQ Victory Fund endorsed candidate Kristal Larson won her election for Avon Township Clerk and became the first out trans person ever elected to a non-judicial position in Illinois history. She is also just the second out trans person to ever win election in the state, the first being Jill Rose Quinn in her race for Circuit Court of Cook County last year. Larson faced a transphobic attack in the lead-up to election night, when an Avon Township supervisor distributed a flyer using her deadname. The flyer encouraged voters to oppose her election.

Mayor *Annise Parker*, President & CEO of LGBTQ Victory Fund, released the following statement about Larson's victory:

"Kristal won this election because she knows her community well and will be a committed public servant, but the impact of her victory will extend far beyond the borders of Avon Township. At a time when trans people are under constant attack by

politicians who weaponize hate for political gain, Kristal's victory will counter their bigoted narrative and help transform perceptions of who trans people are. Kristal will become a role model and inspiration for many trans people who too rarely see themselves in positions of power. Her victory is a reminder that despite the anti-trans rhetoric from politicians, voters believe trans people can make great elected leaders."
